I. Introduction

1. The Registry submits the present report (“Registry Report”) and its two annexes consisting of a confidential version of items recognized as evidence formally submitted and its public redacted version, pursuant to the “Directions on the conduct of proceedings” (“Directions”),¹ issued on 4 October 2021 by Trial Chamber I (“Chamber”).

II. Procedural History

2. On 4 October 2021, the Chamber issued its Directions, in which it directed the Registry to: “[...] *reflect all formally submitted items in the eCourt metadata [...]*”, and to “[...] *submit reports for each witness who testifies, indicating which items have been formally submitted by the parties and participants in relation to that witness. The email exchanges [...] are to be annexed to this filing, applying redactions as appropriate*”.²
3. On 26 April 2022, the Office of the Prosecutor (“Prosecution”) called its fifth witness. After the conclusion of the examination of witness P-0736, parties formally submitted items used during the hearings as instructed in the Directions.
4. On 9 May 2022, the Chamber issued the decision on items of evidence recognised as formally submitted for witness P-0736 via email.³ Pursuant to the Directions, the Registry was instructed to apply redactions as appropriate to the emails enclosed in Annex 1 to the filing.

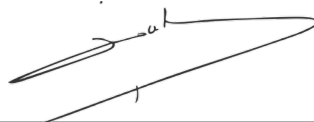

6. The Registry hereby attaches confidential Annex 1:

7. In order to enable the parties and participants to suggest specific additional redactions to Annex 1, the Registry liaised by email with the Prosecution, the Defence, and the Legal Representatives of the Victims.⁴ No further redactions were proposed by the parties.
