## Report on the Registry's Outreach Activities in respect of the Date for the Commencement of the Confirmation of Charges Hearing in the Kony Case

### I. INTRODUCTION

1. Pursuant to Pre-Trial Chamber III's "Decision Setting the Date of the Confirmation of Charges Hearing and Related Time Limits" dated 12 December 2024 ("Decision"),<sup>1</sup> the Registry hereby submits its report on the outreach and notification activities conducted from 6 January until 7 February 2025, regarding the date of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing scheduled for 9 September 2025, as set in the abovementioned decision.<sup>2</sup>
  
2. As instructed in the Decision, the Registry undertook and carried out "notification efforts and outreach activities of the same nature, variety and range as the ones carried out in respect of the date of 15 October 2024, initially set by Pre-Trial Chamber II for the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing."<sup>3</sup> The goal was to ensure that the Chambers instructions were effectively communicated and that the information on the new date of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing reaches out directly to Mr Joseph Kony ("Mr Kony"), and/or through affiliated networks including but not limited to [REDACTED] as well as [REDACTED]. To achieve this overall objective, the Registry's Public Information and Outreach Section ("PIOS") designed and conducted activities based on the Proposed Plan for Outreach Activities<sup>4</sup>. A new activity, engagement with the media, was added to the plan to enhance the media campaign and adapted messages that align with the Decision.

3. The Registry initiated a wide-ranging mass media campaign, utilised social media platforms and conducted targeted and informative face-to-face meetings with [REDACTED], as well as relevant communities and stakeholders in northern Uganda from 6 January to 7 February as ordered by the Chamber.<sup>5</sup> The Registry wishes to indicate that as per its usual *modus operandi*, regular outreach activities will continue beyond 7 February 2025 and the public information materials posted on the ICC website remain and will continue being updated as the case develops.

## II. SUMMARY OF RESULTS

4. As reported in previous Registry reports on notification and outreach activities in respect of the confirmation of charges hearing,<sup>6</sup> radio is one of the most effective tools for disseminating information and reaching broader audiences, [REDACTED]. Consequently, the Registry continued an impactful mass media campaign, utilising local and community radio stations to maximise the reach and effectiveness of the new message.
5. In northern Uganda, [REDACTED], including [REDACTED], PIOS broadcasted short radio programs in the Acholi language, which is widely spoken in the region. The messages aimed to inform the public about the new date for the confirmation of charges hearing scheduled to commence on 9 September 2025.
6. Similarly, in the Central African Republic ("CAR"), the Registry conducted a robust campaign through a mix of key local community radios in locations where it is believed there are communities close to Mr Kony. The language of radio programs used in the CAR

was Sango, to adapt to the context in this country and to strategically reach out to the members of Mr Kony's inner circle who are believed to speak this language.

7. In addition, key newspapers were used to distribute a Questions and Answers paper ("Q&A Paper") aimed at publicising about the confirmation of charges hearing and its date of the commencement, the rights of Mr Kony and of victims, and addressing general misunderstandings and misconceptions about the proceedings.
8. Efforts to ensure that Mr Kony is made aware of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing involved a multi-faceted campaign that employed different communication channels. One of the approaches used was engaging with [REDACTED], through face-to-face meetings to share the information via word of mouth. This involved organising a series of meetings, including [REDACTED]. Moreover, a meeting with influential interlocutors, such as the [REDACTED] and civil society representatives in northern Uganda, and bilateral meetings with the [REDACTED] were held to reinforce the messages.
9. The specific page on the ICC website that was created in relation to the Kony case during the implementation of the Proposed Plan for Outreach Activities was updated with all relevant information regarding, amongst others, the new start date of the confirmation of charges hearing, and information materials produced during this campaign, including the Q&A document in English, French and Acholi and a new short video with the Spokesperson of the Court in English and French. The Registry also made the most of its social media platforms such as X/Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn and through WhatsApp groups, to increase the impact of its publicity efforts, highlighting ongoing outreach activities in the region with photos and sharing relevant information materials.
10. The following results of the outreach efforts were achieved, details of which are provided in the subsequent headings:

- i. Seven hours of interactive live radio programmes were held on three radio stations in Gulu and Kitgum, with fifty-three individuals participating in the programmes through phone-ins, WhatsApp and text messaging;
- ii. Pre-recorded messages in the form of short radio programs in Acholi communicating, the date of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing and the charges against Mr Kony were aired on three popular vernacular radio stations, namely, Mega FM, Rupiny FM and Mighty Fire FM radio stations five times a day, bringing the total of programs broadcasted to 430;
- iii. 32 journalists in Gulu, members of the Northern Uganda Media Club (NUMEC), including senior editors, Bureau Chiefs, bloggers, radio presenters and news anchors, were engaged through an interactive media briefing. Outreach continued follow up with the NUMEC members journalists through sharing the video Q&A with the ICC Spokesperson produced in English, audio spot messages and document containing Q&A;
- iv. An estimated audience of eight million people in northern Uganda, and some parts of Southern Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo ("DRC"), were reached through the radio campaign in northern Uganda;
- v. 48,700 copies of the Q&A Paper in two leading national daily newspapers, Daily Monitor and New Vision, were printed and circulated nationwide on 20 and 24 January 2025 respectively; the New Vision carried 26,000 copies inserts of the Q&A factsheet in Acholi and were distributed countrywide; to further propagate the factsheet, the New Vision uploaded the document on its online page<sup>7</sup> and each day during the period it was online, it received an average of 26,000 readers, and it was accessible for two weeks.. Likewise, the Daily Monitor uploaded the advert on its

website<sup>8</sup> on 21 March 2024 and was accessible next two weeks, with an estimated daily readership of 34,000 people;

viii. 875 community members and stakeholders [REDACTED], were engaged directly in three different meetings with Outreach staff, including some of Mr Kony's [REDACTED];

ix. In the Central African Republic ("CAR"), [REDACTED], short radio programs in Sango were broadcast through community radios;

x. The updated page on the ICC website created in relation to the Kony case and containing all information and materials,<sup>9</sup> received 2,022 page views by 1,451 visitors during the period; and

xi. 82 posts, highlighting the press release, the Q&A Paper and the outreach efforts in the region, were published on the Court's social media platforms, generating a total of 370,000 impressions (i.e. number of times the content was displayed on a screen) and 19,000 engagements (i.e. number of interactions with the content – likes, comments, shares, saves, etc.).

### III. ACTIVITIES

#### A. Media campaign, traditional mass media

##### a. Broadcast of Short Radio programs - Spot Messages

11. On 17 January 2025, to ensure that larger audiences in northern Uganda and its surroundings receive information on the developments in the proceedings and are informed of the start date of the confirmation of charges hearing, three radio stations - Mega FM 102, Rupiny FM 95.7 and Mighty Fire FM 91.5 – started to broadcast short radio programs in

Acholi with pre-recorded spot messages. The key messages consisting of ten segments were designed in a question-and-answer format, and addressed the most frequently asked questions about the proceedings. The questions were collected from the audience during various interactions with different communities.

12. From 17 January 2025, these messages were broadcast five times daily in different popular slots during peak hours - morning, noon, and evening and late evening, in order to ensure that the audience remained well informed and updated. The radio stations provided complementary bonus broadcasting time, resulting in a total of 420 broadcasts during the reporting period. PIOS opted for the reinforcement and expansion of this segment of the campaign with additional broadcasts, thus increasing the likelihood that Mr Kony would hear the details regarding the date of the confirmation of charges hearing as well as the charges against him, either directly or through conveyed messages.

b. Interactive Radio Programs

13. PIOS participated in eight live interactive radio talk shows on Mega FM, Radio Rupiny and Choice FM in Gulu City, located in the Acholi sub-region. These three community radio stations are among the most popular and trusted vernacular channels, particularly among rural communities in northern Uganda and around the region's borders, serving as significant platforms for wide dissemination of information.
14. Mega FM hosted live radio discussions on 6 and 22 January 2025 from 19:00 – 21:00. This timeslot is the station's prime listening time when the majority of the target audience is tuned in, ensuring maximum reach and engagement with the public. Rupiny FM hosted a programme on 8 January 2025 during the station's popular radio programme called "Abokalam", which means "the big discussion". Choice FM broadcasted a three hours long interactive live programme on 11 January 2025 during its weekly Saturday panel discussion. The discussions were tailored and focused, providing an in-depth understanding of the

Chamber's decisions<sup>10</sup> in a language suitable for general audience, the charges against Mr Kony, the presumption of innocence of suspects before the ICC and the appointment of a defence counsel to represent the rights of the suspect during proceedings even in his absence. In all programmes, the Registry staff would highlight the date of the confirmation of charges hearing and accommodate the different listening patterns of the audiences.

15. The programmes were dynamic and interactive, fostering dialogue with the public, and establishing an opportunity for participation through call-ins. Fifty-three individuals from various locations in the Acholi sub-region and the outskirts phoned-in, or texted the studio numbers and expressed their optimism in the ongoing proceedings. At the same time, some expressed their concerns that Mr Kony, who remains a suspect at large, may not surrender himself for trial if the charges were to be confirmed. Others feared that proceeding with the confirmation of charges hearing could result in Mr Kony returning to the Acholi Sub-region and restarting hostilities.

16. An estimated population of eight million people across the Acholi, Lango, West Nile sub-regions in northern Uganda, and border area of Southern Sudan and the DRC, listened to the programmes aired on the three abovementioned radio stations. Moreover, an additional estimated audience of 75,346 people followed the live streaming of the discussions, and on the radios' online platforms, such as Facebook, X (formally Twitter) and WhatsApp.

c. Media interaction with Gulu-based journalists

17. In addition to the media campaigns, PIOS engaged with journalists in Gulu to provide updates on the developments in the present case and to highlight the change of the date of the confirmation of charges hearing, leveraging their platforms to reach broader and more

diverse audiences. The media stories<sup>11</sup> produced following the engagement enhanced the likelihood of further spreading the information in Uganda and beyond, gaining visibility and fostering public awareness of the recent judicial developments in the case.

d. Radio campaign in the CAR

18. In close coordination with relevant sections of the Registry and based on the information provided by them, PIOS expanded also its radio campaign in the CAR.

19. In particular, the campaign was focused in three locations selected based on information available to the Registry and [REDACTED] and the fact that it is the area where victims of crimes allegedly committed by the Lord Resistance Army in the CAR reside. The three local community radios [REDACTED] were selected to broadcast ICC-produced short radio programs explaining the ICC proceedings against Mr Kony (including the charges against him) and the most commonly asked questions in Sango. The ten programs with spot messages in the form of questions and answers ("Q&A") in Sango were broadcasted for a period of three weeks starting from 27 January 2025 on the said three community radios, three times per week, three times per day.

e. Publication of a Q&A Paper

20. On Monday 20 January 2025, in order to widely publicise the start date of the confirmation of charges hearing, address any misconceptions and respond to critical questions and concerns expressed by the public regarding the proceedings *in absentia*, the Registry

published in English, a full page Q&A Paper, in the New Vision Newspaper. The advertisement was prominently positioned on page 13 of the publication, which increased its visibility and accessibility to readers.

21. As one of the country's longest-established national dailies, the abovementioned newspaper was chosen for its dedicated and wide readership from across all sectors of the Ugandan population, and neighbouring countries. The publication's Monday edition features fewer advertisements than other days of the week, allowing readers to engage more deeply with the content of the Q&A Paper. This creates a unique opportunity for a more focused reading of the factsheet. Ten thematic topics were covered, and 26,000 copies were circulated nationwide.
22. The newspaper also carried an insert produced in the Acholi language containing thirteen questions and answers, further expounding on the essential elements related to the ICC judicial proceedings in relation to the present case. The publication of 26,000 copies was circulated nationwide, with 5,000 copies distributed in the northern region, a key target population for this information campaign.
23. Further, the newspaper hosted the Q&A Paper on its online platform, and it has been viewed over 45,000 times since it was uploaded. It was online for two weeks from 19 January to 4 February 2025, potentially reaching the Ugandan diaspora worldwide.
24. The Daily Monitor, the second-largest leading daily national newspaper, also featured a full page of the same Q&A Paper in its publication of 24 January 2025. A total of 22,000 copies were distributed countrywide and uploaded to the paper's website, which remained accessible for a period of two weeks, potentially reaching the Ugandan diaspora worldwide. Further, the newspaper hosted the Q&A Paper on its online platform and it has been viewed approximately 34,000 times since it was uploaded.

25. To increase the multiplier effect of spreading the Q&A Paper, PIOS shared the links from the respective abovementioned publications widely with WhatsApp groups and other platforms of civil society activists, legal and academic communities, victims' associations, media groups and other related networks in Uganda.
26. The Q&A Paper in English<sup>12</sup> and French<sup>13</sup> was also shared with the African Press Organization ("APO"), for distribution to their pan-African database, with a focus on CAR, Uganda, and Sudan media. APO is one of the most prominent press release distribution services in Africa with an extensive media database.

## **B. Engagement with relevant stakeholders and communities**

- a. Engagement/dialogue with influential clan and community leaders and community outreach

27. The multi-pronged campaign to inform Mr Kony of the new date of the confirmation of charges and the charges against him included [REDACTED], as this was deemed one of the best ways to potentially reach him through word of mouth.
28. On 6 January 2025, the Registry held a close-door bilateral meeting [REDACTED]. The Registry provided updates on the present case, highlighting the new date for the confirmation of charges hearing scheduled to commence on 9 September 2025. This meeting was tailored solely for information purposes, providing an opportunity to clarify complex information and issues about the ICC proceedings of the present case.

29. The Registry held two separate bilateral meetings with [REDACTED] to inform them of the updates in the ICC proceedings and especially in relation to the new date of the confirmation of charges hearing. These [REDACTED] and continue to play a pivotal role in the transitional justice discourse in the region. They expressed gratitude to the Registry for including them in its notification and outreach activities and sharing with them the recent developments in the present case, as it helps to foster stronger collaboration with and understanding of the Court. They welcomed the new date and committed to using their platforms to disseminate the information to their constituent members.

30. In addition, the Registry carried out two other meetings in [REDACTED]. The first of these interactions with [REDACTED] took place on 7 January 2025 [REDACTED], and was attended by 603 inhabitants of the community, including influential representatives from [REDACTED], religious and cultural leaders, youth, women and the general members of the locality. The Registry updated the participants on the recent developments in the present case as well as the date of the confirmation of charges hearing. Other areas, such as the presumption of innocence and the rights of an ICC suspect – whether present or not in the proceedings - to be represented by a counsel constituted part of the discussions.

31. On 8 January 2025, the Registry organised a similar community meeting in [REDACTED], attended by 295 participants, most of whom said to be [REDACTED]. This engagement replicated a similar format as during the interactive session in [REDACTED], and was used by the Registry to reinforce key messages related to developments in the present case, highlighting the date of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing, and to thereafter respond to questions. The Registry observed continuous high interest among these communities which was demonstrated by consistency in their large attendance and coupled with the substantive issues and questions discussed.

b. Stakeholders' meetings in Gulu city with key interlocutors, [REDACTED]

32. As directed by the Chamber, PIOS replicated a majority of the activities in the Proposed Plan for Outreach Activities, engaging with critical actors in northern Uganda who remain active in the transitional justice discourse. They included [REDACTED].
33. Despite being in existence during the 2006-2008 peace negotiations between the government of Uganda and the LRA, the abovementioned structures remain relevant and influential. The [REDACTED] reported to various ICC representatives [REDACTED] with Mr Kony. Recently, it was reported that letters purported to be written by Mr Kony were delivered to some [REDACTED]. As a result, [REDACTED].
34. On 14 January 2025, the Registry held an interactive dialogue with 82 of these stakeholders, comprising of [REDACTED] civil society representatives, the academia, victims groups and local government leaders who have been involved in transitional justice processes in the region. The dialogue was facilitated by the Registry, explaining the proceedings as well as informing of the start date of the confirmation of charges hearing.
35. Most of the attendees actively participated in outreach activities during the trial of Mr Dominic Ongwen, welcomed the Chamber's decision to proceed with the confirmation of charges hearing in the Kony case, and expressed optimism that Mr Kony may eventually surrender to the ICC or, alternatively, be arrested and surrendered to the ICC. They noted that such an outcome could provide an opportunity for victims in this case to seek reparations if he is found guilty following a trial. Some noted that the decision to hold confirmation of charges *in absentia* has once again brought attention to the situation of northern Uganda and called on States Parties and the international community to intensify efforts to facilitate Mr Kony's arrest. There was also fear among some participants that the renewed efforts to hold proceedings against Mr Kony may spur him to renew hostilities in northern Uganda.

### **C. Social media - Audio-visual materials and posts on social media platforms**

36. PIOS used its social media platforms – X/Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn<sup>14</sup> – to raise awareness about the new starting date of the confirmation of charges hearing, highlighting the ongoing notification efforts in the region. In particular, a short video, with Frequently Asked Questions (“FAQs”), as well as photos with information on the various outreach activities in the region, were posted.

37. Over the reported period, 82 posts were published on the Court’s social media platforms, generating a total of 370,000 impressions (i.e. number of times the content was displayed on a screen) and 19,000 engagements (i.e. number of interactions with the content – likes, comments, shares, saves, etc.).

#### **D. ICC website**

38. PIOS updated the specific subpage created in relation to the Kony case both in English and French adding all relevant new documents in relation to the case, including the various decisions, an online version of the new FAQs in the case in English, French and Acholi, and a new short video.<sup>15</sup>

39. The said subpage was highlighted on the homepage of the ICC website and shared on the Court’s social media platforms. The webpage (in both English and French) received 2,022 page views by 1,541 visitors during the period from 6 January to 11 February 2025.

## **IV. REACTIONS, QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS RAISED**

40. From the comments expressed during the interactive radio programmes and face-to-face meetings with relevant stakeholders, interest in relation to the ICC proceedings against Mr Kony remains high amongst the Ugandan population, particularly the victims but also the communities close to the suspect.
41. As information about the confirmation of charges hearing in the absence of suspect is no longer new among the affected communities and the reactions were largely similar to the one reported in the previous Registry Report.<sup>16</sup> There is now a better understanding of the provisions in the Rome Statute that allows for such proceedings to take place in the absence of the suspect. There was still cautious optimism about the benefit of such a process to the victims while others were unreservedly positive about the date that the victims who have waited for 19 years could, for the first time, have the opportunity to be heard at the ICC through their legal representatives. Some concerns were related to the (limited) number of charges and to the crimes allegedly committed outside of the scope of the Document Containing the Charges. Others were related to the possibility of arresting Mr Kony and the available enforcement mechanisms. A number of questions, especially those received during the radio discussions, were about the suspect's rights, presumption of innocence and how the Chamber can maintain this balance during the confirmation of charges in the absence of the suspect. A number of questions were asked about the judicial proceedings and the next steps. Lastly, the interlocutors were also interested in the participation of victims in the proceedings and possibilities for reparations.

## V. CONCLUSION

42. As instructed by the Chamber in the Decision, the Registry informs that it has taken the necessary measures to conduct effective outreach activities regarding the date of the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing scheduled to commence on 9

September 2025, which were “of the same nature, variety and range as the ones carried out in respect of the date of 15 October 2024, initially set by Pre-Trial Chamber II for the commencement of the confirmation of charges hearing.”<sup>17</sup>

43. The Registry has ensured that varied and extended channels of communication were utilised to reach a large population, [REDACTED] Mr Kony to ensure they are aware of the judicial proceedings against him. The activities started on 6 January, following the production of all relevant information and materials related to the campaign in several relevant languages, English, French, Acholi, Arabic and Sango, (i.e. videos, Q&A Paper, cards and visuals for social media, spots and messages).
44. As mentioned in the above paragraph 4, the Registry will continue with its regular outreach activities in relation to the present case, as per its usual *modus operandi*. Upcoming activities would include some radio broadcasts in Uganda and CAR planned for 13 February 2025. Finally, the specific information materials developed in relation to this case will remain available on the ICC website and will be updated as the judicial proceedings in the present case progress.
