Subject: RE: Prosecution anticipated witness order for the First Block

Dear Trial Chamber V,
 Dear All,

In respect of the first block of witnesses, the Prosecution would like to bring the following to the Chamber's attention. For the first witness, P-2682, the Prosecution has indicated her anticipated testimony (examination-in-chief) to take 4 hours. The Defence for Mr Yekatom has assessed their examination to take 4.5 hours, and the legal representatives to take 30-45 minutes. The Defence for Mr Ngaissona has not provided any estimate.

Taking into account the Court's sitting hours (4,5 hours per day), and the fact that it can be expected that some time in Court will be used to address issues in addition to the witness' testimony (such as procedural matters and formalities), it is likely that P-2682 will testify on 15, 16 and 18 March 2021. In theory, P-1577 could thus start his testimony on 18 or 19 March 2021.

Doing so would allow the Prosecution to keep the proposed witness order intact, which would be beneficial to the preparation of the Parties and Participants and presentation of the case. However, as the Prosecution's Rule 68(3) application for P-1577 had to be refiled due to a clerical error (ICC-01/14-01/18-871-Conf), its 3 February notification date would preclude his testimony until 22 March, as testifying on 18 March would otherwise occur within 43 days of the application ([REDACTED]).

Accordingly, the Prosecution seeks the Chamber's guidance: namely, whether it should re-arrange the witness order (with P-2193 or P-2926 possibly testifying earlier than scheduled), or whether the Chamber would consider authorising the Prosecution to exceptionally call P-1577 within less than 45 days of the filing of its Rule 68(3) application.

The Prosecution has sought the Parties and Participants' views, and they do not oppose calling P-1577 a few days earlier.

Alternatively, P-1577 could start his evidence on Monday, 22 March regardless of the duration of P-2682's testimony. The Prosecution believes keeping the current order will be the least prejudicial to the Defence. For the sake of completeness, the Prosecution also informs the Chamber that the estimated time of examination for P-1577 has been assessed at 5 hours for the Prosecution, 30-45 minutes for each of the participants, and 45 minutes for Defence for Mr Yekatom.
