SUMMARY OF THE EXPERTISE (AND AFFILIATION) OF EACH APPLICANT¹

1. Louise Arimatsu specializes in international law including international criminal law and international humanitarian law. She is currently Distinguished Policy Fellow with the LSE Centre for Women, Peace and Security of the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), and Principal Visiting Research Fellow at Reading University. She holds a doctorate in law on defences in international criminal law from LSE.
2. Adejoké Babington-Ashaye is an expert with over 19 years of expertise in international criminal law and investigations, international human rights law, and public international law. She is the Co-Author and Co-Editor of *International Criminal Investigations: Law and Practice* and has written on accountability for sexual and gender-based crimes, as well as the assessment of evidence and a review of investigative deficiencies in international criminal cases. Ms Babington-Ashaye has contributed to UNODC training modules on international crimes, and provides training to national judges, prosecutors, and investigators on accountability for sexual and gender-based crimes by state and non-state actors. She served as an investigator at the ICC from 2005-2012, where she worked on the Darfur, CAR, and Kenya situations. Ms Babington-Ashaye holds an LL.M in Public International Law with a specialization in International Criminal Law from the LSE.
3. Kirsten Campbell is an expert on sexual violence evidence in international criminal law. She holds a doctorate in law on sexual violence as an international crime (LSE), a doctorate in modern languages (Oxon), and is a qualified solicitor and barrister (Australia). She is currently a professor in socio-legal studies at the University of London. Professor Campbell has published extensively on sexual violence evidence in leading international law journals (cited by ICC jurisprudence), as well as providing expert evidence in this area to the UN, UK House of Lords, and the European Parliament.
4. Danya Chaikel is a qualified barrister and solicitor in Canada and an expert on international criminal law and gender-based violence. She has worked at international(ised) criminal courts and tribunals, including conducting evidence review at the ICC and SPO (Kosovo), and was a member of the ICTY Appeals Chamber drafting team that prepared the final appeal judgment of the Tribunal. Her 20 years of experience is grounded in human rights and gender justice, including positions at UN bodies, NGOs, and a Canadian government agency. She is currently consulting at the International Federation for Human Rights'

International Desk in The Hague and is the incoming Co-Vice-Chair of the International Bar Association's War Crimes Committee.

5. Christine Chinkin is Emerita Professor of International Law and the founding Director of the LSE Centre for Women, Peace and Security where she is currently a Professorial Research Fellow. She is also a L Bates Lea Global Law Professor at the University of Michigan Law School. She has researched and taught for many years and is the author of many publications on international law, international human rights law, the UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women, and the UN Security Council's agenda on Women, Peace and Security.
6. Carolyn Edgerton is an Associate Member of Guernica 37 International Justice Chambers. She has three decades of experience in domestic and international criminal investigations and prosecutions. From 1994 - 2017, she worked as a Legal Officer and Trial Attorney at the ICTY, where she was the component team leader responsible for all aspects of the investigation, pre-trial preparation, and courtroom presentation of evidence in the trial of Radovan Karadžić. She served as a member of investigations and trial teams in multiple other cases including in the case against Ratko Mladic. Crimes of sexual and gender-based violence have been central to much of her work. She has led training and mentorship projects for Gambian prosecutors and judiciary, which included special modules on sexual violence cases. Ms Edgerton co-drafted a rights-based manual on the investigation, prosecution and adjudication of rape, and other forms of sexual violence for investigators and prosecutors in Georgia. In 2020-2021 she also trained members of the Afghan Independent Human Rights Commission on investigating international crimes, including sexual and gender-based violence crimes.
7. Priya Gopalan is an international criminal lawyer with two decades of experience in domestic and international litigation. She specialises in gender and conflict-related sexual violence. She was a prosecutor and appeals counsel at the ICTY where she also worked on cases that developed progressive legal precedents on conflict-related sexual violence (Djordjević and Milutinović et al.). Ms Gopalan was the first Legal Advisor for Sexual and Gender-Based Crimes at the IIIM Syria and Gender Advisor for the OHCHR Investigation on Sri Lanka. She teaches and publishes regularly on the subject, and provides expert advice to states, UN agencies, and other entities. She holds an LL.M in Public International Law (Distinction) from the LSE. She is a member of the UN Working Group on Arbitrary Detention.
8. Gorana Mlinarević is an expert in sexual violence witness evidence in international criminal law. She is a human rights practitioner and holds master's degrees in International Human

Rights Law (Oxon) and Human Rights and Democracy (Universities of Sarajevo and Bologna). She is the author of two leading social scientific studies of conflict-related sexual violence evidence, as well as numerous publications in leading international criminal law and human rights journals and collections. She has provided expert evidence in this area to the UN and the UK House of Lords.

9. Angela Mudukuti is a human rights lawyer specialised in international criminal law. With over a decade of experience Ms Mudukuti has worked for several organisations including the ICC, Open Society Foundations, Human Rights Watch, Wayamo Foundation, and the Southern Africa Litigation Centre. Focusing on strategic litigation, advocacy, and capacity building, her work has ranged from training prosecutors and investigators to enhance domestic capacity to tackle international crimes to working on universal jurisdiction and precedent-setting cases before South African courts including seeking the arrest of the former president of Sudan during his visit to South Africa. She has published extensively in books, journals, and newspapers. She holds an LL.M in international criminal law from the University of Western Cape in conjunction with Humboldt University of Berlin.
10. Cynthia T. Tai Esq. is an expert with close to three decades of experience in international and domestic litigation focused on sexual and gender-based violence. She has extensive experience in sexual violence investigations and prosecution. She is Executive Director at Project Expedite Justice, an NGO that offers investigation and international criminal law consulting services, including litigation strategy for national, regional, and international mechanisms. She served as a Senior Investigation and Senior Trial Lawyer at the ICC from 2007-2013, where she was a principal member of the Jean-Pierre Bemba case (CAR) and the William Ruto case (Kenya). Ms Tai holds a Juris Doctor degree from McGeorge School of Law and a BA in Political Science from the University of Southern California. As a domestic prosecutor, she conducted numerous jury trials (violent crime, cold case homicides, and sexual assaults), over 500 bench trials, and thousands of contested evidentiary hearings. She has expertise with the rules of authenticity, relevance, and admissibility standards at national and international tribunals. She is currently a pro tem Judge in the Third Circuit District of Hawaii.
